

A God in the Midst of Loss

Once, in Florida—where houses sometimes collapse due to swampy ground—I heard of someone exasperated by a legal problem. Their insurance company refused to pay a claim by invoking a legal loophole. The policy covered structural collapse but excluded property damage caused by "wear and tear" or "earth movement." Since 99% of collapses in that area were due to Florida's soil, it was evident that what the insurer claimed on paper was nearly impossible to uphold in practice. In South America, we use the word *leguleyada* (legal chicanery) to refer to such manipulative tricks. After graduating from law school, I learned to reject these kinds of conveniently twisted interpretations. However, I've come to notice that *leguleyadas* also have a place in the world of theology.

In the face of terrible loss and suffering, like the devastation caused by floods in Texas, it is inevitable to ask why God allows such things. Unable to grapple with that mystery, we resort to *leguleyadas*: "God didn't do it, He just allowed it," "Everything happens for a reason," "God won't give you more than you can handle." Of course, we don't use these expressions to deceive, but to try to understand what we cannot. Our theological *leguleyadas* fulfill the formal requirements of an explanation but become disconnected from the emotional experience that loss exerts on us. And yet, deep down, we know: God is not an argument—God is presence.

The Bible speaks of adversity in many different ways. When adversity arises from human injustice, it calls it sin, and suffering opens up the opportunity for repentance. When Scripture reveals that bad things happen as a consequence of wrongdoing, it calls it judgment, offering the opportunity for prophetic denunciation and social repair. When misfortune falls upon the righteous, it is called a test, which becomes an occasion for strengthening and growth. Notice how adversity is the same in each case, but the meaning and opportunities that arise come from our belief in a God who desires our well-being. So, even if we cannot grasp the universal mechanics of suffering, we can still, trusting in God's love, discover in life's blows a multitude of meanings that may restore us and make us more whole—even if it is very hard to see at first.

The church must not forget that it is also the presence of God for others, especially for those who experience the "silence of God" in the midst of pain. The old Methodist motto expresses this well—not with arguments, but with actions: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." It's paradoxical, but perhaps there is no better way to describe how divine omnipotence can work through human finitude! We are called to be there for others—not simply to fulfill a commandment, but because it is part of our nature, a nature transformed by grace.

Dear Walnut Grove Church Family,


