The Gospel of Listening and Stillness

"Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her."

—Luke 10:42b

My wife, Fiorella, has two sisters, Eliana and Cynthia. I'm always struck by how different they are. Eliana, the eldest, is home-loving and hospitable; she loves to show affection by serving. Fiore, by contrast, is independent, prefers to go out, and is always looking for ways to change the world. Cynthia, the youngest, is a fitness influencer on social media, she is entrepreneurial and always eager to dress well and look her best. Whenever we visit the three of them, I can't help thinking, "The Guerrero sisters are like the March sisters in Little Women." Eliana reminds me of Meg, proud of her role as mother and wife; Fiore recalls Jo, with her adventurous, independent spirit; and Cynthia feels like Amy, elegant and beauty-seeking. Listening to their conversations is a delight: their differing personalities create a kind of cheerful chaos that, though I can't quite explain it, entertains me and makes me feel at home.

I open my Bible to Luke 10 and think, "If I have the Guerrero sisters and Theodore Laurence ('Laurie') has the March sisters, surely Jesus had Martha and Mary!" These two sisters were just as different: Martha naturally takes on the role of hostess, while Mary is eager to learn everything the young Rabbi has to say. Luke—the evangelist who most emphasizes women as disciples—doesn't record that detail by accident. He does not believe Christian women should be passive: he shows Martha acting as the mistress of the house, exercising a public role unusual for a woman; and he portrays Mary in the posture of a male disciple, "at the Master's feet," in an age when women were barred from rabbinic schools. The issue, then, is not their personalities—but something deeper.

Jesus, as a trusted friend, is drawn into Martha's complaint against Mary: "Tell her to help me!" We know His answer: "You are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one." I reread the passage and wonder, "Did Martha really fail? Was Jesus unfair to her? And what is that 'one thing' that is necessary?"

For a long time, tradition treated Martha unfairly, reading her as sheer activity and Mary as contemplation—and therefore superior. Yet Jesus never asks Martha to give up hospitality or service. Speaking affectionately ("Martha, Martha..."), He wants to free her, not from what she does but from what steals her joy: the feeling that all the weight rests on her shoulders. First-century social expectations pressed the hostess into lavish service, much as today we can feel pressure to please everyone, fear losing people, meet beauty standards, or avoid rejection. In her eagerness to be a good hostess, Martha is isolated in the kitchen—away from friends, neighbors, her sister, and Jesus Himself.

Mary, by contrast, has chosen "what is better." Jesus neither abolishes hospitality nor exalts passivity. He reminds us we need right priorities so that our efforts do not turn to anxiety. Mary embodies a kind of mindful attention that resists social pressure. She listens to the Word, she attends to the voice that helps

her examine her conscience, discern the important (not merely the urgent), and equips her for a non-anxious, free life. Luke thus suggests we be Mary first and Martha afterward. Both archetypes must coexist in us, lest we lapse into activism without listening or contemplation without engagement—but we must start with listening.

So, what is "the one thing necessary"? Not passivity, but the attentive stillness born of the Word. It is no accident Luke places Martha and Mary between the Good Samaritan and the Lord's Prayer: to love neighbor and love God we must first sit, rest, and listen intently to the divine voice that shows us what truly matters and makes us authentically ourselves.

OCIM Update

Summer break has arrived! Food Shortages for students during the summer break are a serious issue as many children rely on school meals for their daily nutrition. When school is out, many students lose access to these meals, thus leading to increased food insecurity.

Some communities have summer feeding programs to help bridge the gap. For example, in Northern Orange County, Orange Congregations in Missions (OCIM) aid in helping families provide food for their families that might otherwise go hungry. OCIM like other Programs are often funded by state or federal initiatives that aim to ensure children receive proper nutrition even when school is not in session. Many of those funds have been cut. However, OCIM receives donations of food or money from several churches such as our church to help provide food for the hungry.

However, challenges remain. Many families struggle with rising grocery prices, rent prices, and cost of gas, and lack sufficient resources to meet the demand. Organizations like OCIM work to distribute food and essentials to families in need, recognizing that summer hunger can have long-term effects on children's health and education.

- 1. Once a family is approved by Social Services and OCIM's Kay Stagner, Mrs. Stagner will give volunteers the paperwork to show that the family was approved.
- 2. Our volunteers in the food pantry will fill the request for food from the shelves in the Pantry based on the number in the family.
- 3. The volunteers will place grocery items in grocery bags in a grocery cart for the recipient to take home.

Many of you have made donations of canned food and other items as well as monetary donations to help OCIM meet the needs of the hungry in Northern Orange County.

Our church gave 692 pounds of food in June.

Please consider bringing canned food like peanut butter, green beans, corn, jelly, rice, spaghetti sauce, tomato soup, chicken soup, to church on **August 31** (our next 5th Sunday).

There is a grey tub in the Fellowship Hall where you can place your donations.

Another way to help: If you are raising vegetables in your gardens and have more than you can use, please consider taking the extra veggies to OCIM located in Hillsborough. It will be greatly appreciated.

If you want to donate money, please write in the memo of your check, OCIM or OCIM on the offering envelope then drop the check or envelope in the offering plate.

Let's make another concerted effort to work together to feed the children and their families in Northern Orange County on August 31st.
