Busyness

The title doesn't even look like a real word, does it? When it's written out, it doesn't look right. While we are busy all the time and describe ourselves as busy, we don't often see "busyness" written out, so it looks silly. I say this because I want us to see the whole notion of busyness as silly.

Now hold on, I'm not trying to undermine your

schedule or preach at you to be better at time management (God knows I could do better!). There's so little we can control: doctor's appointments, family emergencies, getting called into work by your boss, unexpected guests, etc. These things which take up our time, whether welcomed or not, make themselves at home in our calendars without leaving much room left. I look with both excitement and weariness at seeing how few days I have in June to just be in one spot! Between Israel, General Assembly, Camp Duffield, and other things in-between, while I look forward to all of it, it can still feel overwhelming.

I know many families plan trips, and while it seems contradictory, stress seems to come with planning and going on trips! Afterwards, you need a vacation from your vacation! I sympathize with students and families today who seem so much busier than I was in high school. The idea of taking on one more activity seems like the card that causes the whole fragile house to come tumbling down. So what's the solution for all this? While we like to view summer as a time of relaxation and as a break, Scripture speaks to another kind of break that I would encourage we re-implement into our lives. Yes, you guessed it: the Sabbath. "Sabbath" is kind of a "churchy" word, but it references a day in which we cease from all work. It was a day declared holy by God in which every man, woman, and child, would refrain from labor. Exodus 20:10 says, "On that day no one in your household may do any work. This includes you, your sons and daughters, your male and female servants, your livestock, and any foreigners living among you" (NLT). Even animals weren't supposed to work!

So, what do we do on the Sabbath? Well, we figure that out when we see what the point is. The Sabbath puts our focus back on God. It reminds us of His goodness, His provision, and that we are completely dependent upon Him. It reminds us that we are in God's eternal rest and that we are not saved by our works (Hebrews 4:9-11). It reminds us to spend time with God in prayer, and the Word, to be taught and to learn (Luke 13:10). It gives us time to be in fellowship with other believers and to be with those who are in need (Matthew 12:12). I appreciate what John Piper says concerning the Sabbath, "It is designed to provide a weekly meal of rever-

ence for our shriveling souls. Sunday should not be trivial. It should be holy—set apart for God. A day in which we delight ourselves in the Lord in ways we can't on other busy days. Many innocent and good things should probably be replaced with deeper things on the Lord's day" ("Sabbath Hedonism,"). Notice he said it serves in contrast to our busy days. We partake in it because it's a Holy Commandment by God and He wants us to delight in Him!

We should certainly have Jesus on our minds every day, but our busyness and work and family responsibilities prevent us from being able to just read the Bible every hour of every day (1 Corinthians 7:26-35). So, God created the Sabbath so we may devote an entire day to recenter ourselves back on Him. Otherwise, it's too easy for us to fall into the concerns of the world and lose sight of our eternal hope. Busyness can give the feeling of anxiety, that we have to be doing *something*. The feeling that playing a game with family or sitting on your porch and watching the birds is somehow sinful because you aren't being productive. The feeling that we have to work in order to provide, the feeling that it's all up to us, creeps in and grows without hindrance. The Sabbath helps us enjoy and recognize the gifts God has given us, and that includes family, friends, even nature! Having the Sabbath one day a week also prevents us from seeing work as bad, because it isn't (unless you're a hitman or maybe a used car salesman). Work was instituted by God (Genesis 2:15), not as a punishment, but as a pleasure. We should not see providing for ourselves and our family as a burden, nor see work as punishment, for our work is a demonstration of our faith (John 15; 1 Timothy 5:8; James 1:22). Instead, the Sabbath helps us have the right mindset as we go back into work to remember why we work: not just for ourselves or even for our family, but primarily to glorify God. There's so much to say about the Sabbath. But I greatly

encourage you to look in Scripture. You can even type in keywords on websites like biblegateway.org to see where the term "Sabbath" appears! Think about it with family and friends: the ones who will help keep each other accountable. What would it look like to set one day aside where you don't work and you spend extra focus on God in all of your activities? It will require planning, just as the Israelites stored up food in preparation for the Sabbath. But try not to go to rigid on it. Sabbath was made for Man, and Jesus has freed us from the law of sin and death. We certainly won't be perfect in our Sabbath-keeping, so don't overwork yourself on trying to rest! Think of it the same way as a tithe: it's a freewill offering to Jesus to show your appreciation and love for Him and all He has done for you.

Don't believe the lie that Jesus expects us to be working 24/7. Even He rested! We are to rest in His unending grace, and Jesus gifts us with rest (Psalm 127:2). The Sabbath is a wonderful practice to both guard us against busyness and to teach us how to rest in Jesus. Just know that resting in Jesus doesn't mean sleeping during the Sunday sermons!

Memory Lane - Sunday School Children's Day

Sunday School has always been a vital part of Lancaster Presbyterian Church. It was most likely important long before 1938, but thanks to Mrs. Nerber, who kept meticulous records, we can read how important our forebears believed it was for children to be in Sunday School. In 1938 pupils from the Beginner Department through the Intermediate Department who attended 25 Sundays from the first Sunday in October (Rally Day) to the second Sunday in June (Children's Day), were awarded a book.

In 1940, to be eligible, pupils from the Beginner through the Intermediate Departments had to have attended 25 sessions of Sunday School <u>and</u> 25 sessions of church (not necessarily on the same Sunday) beginning with Rally Day on the first Sunday in October and ending the Sunday before Children's Day.

Attendance awards were given throughout these years, sometimes a pin and sometimes a book.

In 1951 "One important discussion was held [at the Christian Education Meeting) and that concerned the attendance awards. It was this: that we live rigidly up to the rules of the contest that say, "In the event that he is visiting another Sunday School outside of Lancaster, he must bring a note certifying that outside attendance. Or in the event that he is ill HE MUST BRING AN EXCUSE SIGNED BY EITHER OF HIS PARENTS. NO OTHER EXCUSE WILL BE PERMISSIBLE. (*Capitals in the original*) If those two conditions are not complied with the child will not be eligible for an attendance award." Also in 1951, "...in order that your child may be eligible for the attendance award he will have to be in attendance each and every Sunday from the ninth of September ... until the first Sunday in June (Children's Day), with the possible exception of five Sundays for Nursery and Beginners and three for every other department."

In the list of those who received an attendance award in 1950, we find Jane Richards (Carlsen) listed in the Primary Department. In the photograph below from about 1947, among the names listed is Edward Carlsen in the front center. James Cavanaugh and Lois Strock are the teachers in the other photos.

Sunday School is still an important part of our church life, for both children, youth, and adults. Let's all aim for perfect attendance. Thanks to our Coordinator of Children's Sunday School, Debi Eaton, and all of the teachers who faithfully teach each week.

CompassCare Walk for Life 2023 Report

Wow!! What a great turn out we had for our first Compass Care Walk for Life at Lancaster Presbyterian Church!! 64 Walkers!! What a powerful witness to our community!! Thank you so much to every single person that came. We had Pastors from 3 other churches and our walkers included people from 8 churches. You made it happen!! Thank you to our LPC leadership! The Walk was fully supported with both of our Pastors walking and full Session backing!! Thank you!! Thank you!! God truly blessed us with a beautiful sunny warmish day. We were not only blessed by so many walkers, but people responded very generously to this annual fundraiser for Compass Care. Our walk at LPC raised \$7,760, which is enough to cover the care for over 13 women for one ENTIRE year!! Praise God for this wonderful donation from so many people!! He has truly put this ministry on the hearts of many people. Compass Care's fundraising goal for 2023 for all three of their locations(Buffalo, Rochester, Albany) is \$912,000. As of the writing of this article(5-23-2023) the total raised so far is \$833,838.75, which is 91% of their goal. There are still other walks scheduled, even into June. We will not have a final total until probably July. Locally here in Buffalo there were approximately 35 walks and nationally(yes there are others in our country who have taken an interest in our Compass Care, besides Rochester and Albany, the other 2 Compass Care locations in NY State)there were approximately 65 other walks. We would also like to thank everyone who helped in any way!! Your help with registration, in the kitchen, setting up, baking, children's activities, clean-up and safety were all very important to making this walk a HUGE success. We are already looking forward to doing another walk next year which hopefully will include different speakers and even more churches from the Lancaster area to be involved with us.
