Although there have been many Presidential calls to prayer in the history of our nation, the annual National Day of Prayer was recognized by President Truman in 1952 as a special day set aside to pray for our nation. There is much to discourage us in 2023, but the scripture tells us in many places that we should be diligent in prayer and in trusting and obeying the true God of the Universe as He is revealed in the Bible. It is time to stand up against all the schemes of the devil and not let him have his way. The only way Satan can be defeated is through the prayers of God's people, who trust God and are not afraid to stand for truth and righteousness.

"Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of His might. Put on the full armor of God, so that you will be able to stand firm against the schemes of the devil. ... With all prayer and petition pray at all times in the Spirit" ... Ephesians 6:10-11, 18

"Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous! Do not tremble or be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go." Joshua 1:9

There are two opportunities to observe the National Day of Prayer:


Thursday, May 4 from noon to 12:45 in front of the Lancaster Town Hall (Bring a chair and an umbrella if needed.)

Prayer

Greetings, Beloved! | trust that you are faithful and true in our Lord Jesus, enjoying a rich devotional life with time in the word and prayer. With the National Day of Prayer swiftly approaching (May 4) I thought I would take a little time to reflect with you on some prayer insights that I have discovered in my reading and perusing that have enriched my own devotional life. I hope these reflections serve to bless you in your diligence in prayer.

To begin with, prayer is concerned, first and last and at every point between, with God. Samuel Zwemer, the highly respected missionary known as the "Apostle to Islam," (1867-1952) has aptly described prayer as "God the Holy Spirit talking to God the Father in the name of God the Son, and the believer's heart is the prayer room." Prayer is all about God. As John Bunyan expressed so eloquently: "To pray rightly, you must make God your hope, stay, and all. Right prayer sees nothing substantial, or worth being concerned about except God." When we apprehend the primacy of God in all things, then our confidence in His sovereignty should minimize any preoccupation with worry, doubt or fear. As my friend Dale likes to ask: "Why pray when you can worry?" Or as Corrie Ten Boom has observed, "Any concern too small to be turned into a prayer is too small to be made into a burden." J. C. Ryle, the famous Anglican bishop of the 19th Century summed up this line of thought nicely when he noted, "The only way to be really happy, in such a world as this, is to be ever casting all our cares on God. It is the attempt of carrying their own burdens which so often makes believers sad." And, of course, this sentiment squares nicely with Peter's admonition in the word to "cast all our anxiety on God, because He cares for us" (1 Peter 5:7).

The Apostle Paul is famous for calling us to "pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17). Don Whitney offers helpful clarification here when he suggests that prayer without ceasing, "does not mean that we do nothing but pray, but it does mean that if talking with and thinking of God can't be in the forefront of our minds, it should always be peeking over and ready to take the place of what we are concentrating on." Prayer without ceasing means we never really stop conversing with God; we simply have frequent interruptions.

I am often struck with how reasonable it is for God to expect us to pray. Let me see if I can explain it this way. Whenever I travel, Lisa has a reasonable expectation that I try to keep in touch. She does not look for this communication from me because she is demanding or controlling. She looks to hear from me because she loves me, and she thinks of me. For my part, I never experience the effort to be in touch with Lisa when I travel as a duty, a burden or an obligation, but, rather, as the deep desire of my heart. I think that God's expectation to hear from us is something like the loving communication of my marriage. His command to pray is a command of love. In His love He desires to communicate with us and to bless us. God also expects us to pray just as a general expects to hear from his soldiers in the battle. God expects prayer because that is the means He has ordained for the spiritual warfare between His kingdom and the kingdom of His enemy. To neglect prayer is to sever ourselves perilously from our every resource. Such a course makes no sense. And let us not forget Jesus' example during His earthly ministry. When Jesus walked the earth, He prayed. Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed (Luke 5:16). As Jesus prayed during the time of His earthly ministry, how much more do we need to pray? Prayer is expected of us because we need it. We will not be like Jesus without prayer. We need to pray.

Our adversary knows that we need to pray. Do you think that he is pleased when we pray? Here again, the wisdom of J. C. Ryle is instructive: "The devil is especially angry towards us when he sees us on our knees." Somewhere I heard Derek Thomas say that "if you want to humble a believer, ask him about his prayer life." What a telling insight. One that bears out the diagnosis of Bishop Ryle when he notes: "I am afraid the private devotions of many are most painfully few and limited—just enough to prove they are alive, and no more. They really seem to want little from God. They seem to have little to confess, little to ask for, and little to thank Him for. Is it not to be suspected that many have just as much grace as they ask God for? That they have little, because they ask little?"

I have no desire to discourage anyone from prayer. To the contrary, if we believe with J. C. Ryle that "Prayer is that point, above all others, at which you must be on your quard. It is here that true religion begins; here it flourishes, and here it decays." If we believe in the primacy of prayer, then we should desire to see one another flourishing in prayer. Once again, Bishop Ryle comes to our encouragement with the affirmation, "He loves me best who loves me in his prayers." I agree. If I must choose a congregation, give me a people who pray. I believe that you are that people, beloved. Can we do better? I expect that will always be true. I have always been proud of Lancaster Presbyterian Church as a praying people. I can hardly believe that I get to be your pastor, and I am so very thankful for the work of my friend, Pastor Will. Be blessed in your prayer life, loved ones! And, if you're able to make it out for the National Day of Prayer services on May 4, your presence will surely be a blessing to me. I love you all! Pastor Kelly



About CompassCare

CompassCare is a Christ centered organization dedicated to erasing the need for abortion by transforming a woman's fear into confidence. <u>All services are free.</u> Women primarily get abortions because they feel alone and unsupported. They feel trapped by their circumstances and relationships into a decision they wouldn't otherwise make.

CompassCare erases the need for abortion one woman and one baby at a time by providing three key medical services of 1) Unplanned Pregnancy Decision Care 2) STD testing and treatment and 3) Abortion Pill reversal. They serve women with compassionate, nonjudgmental, and ethical medical care, comprehensive community support, and an invitation to submit their lives to Jesus Christ.

It is the first Christian organization educating people about abortion's risks and side effects.


