



The Age of the Earth

How old is the earth? Do you know? Is this a question that you would feel confident answering before our congregation or our Presbytery? There are believers who love the Lord Jesus and hold fast to the authority of His word but do not share your views in this connection. Are you qualified to renounce their perspectives as heresy? You might be. There are, after all, limits of orthodoxy beyond which we proceed at our peril. But be careful, there are scholars on the list of

those with whom we might disagree who are of great renown and highest repute.

Charles Hodge, the principal of Old Princeton in the latter 1800s, held the Day Age Interpretation, together with B.B. Warfield, J. Gresham Machen (one of my heroes), E.J. Young, Francis Schaefer, and James Montgomery Boice. These names are huge. Meredith Kline (with whom Lisa and I were privileged to study), Mark Futato (of Reformed Theological Seminary), and Henri Blocher (the famous French Theologian) all subscribe(d) some form of the Literary Framework Interpretation. William G.T. Shedd held the Analogical Day Interpretation, a view that is embraced by such famous Reformed thinkers of our time as C. John Collins (of Covenant Theological Seminary) and W. Robert Godfrey (chairman of Ligonier Ministries). For my part, I would not feel adequate to debate any one of these men. But the thing is, every last one of the theological giants on this list subscribes or subscribed what Orthodox Christianity has always affirmed: God's creation of the heavens and the earth ex nihilo (out of nothing) and the special creation of Adam and Eve as actual human beings, the parents of all humanity. The disobedience of our first parents plunged us all into sin and misery, and the only hope of redemption for any of us is by the grace of God through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, the second Adam, who won through the right to represent us before His holy Father in all righteousness, so that "there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:1). We stand in the best company with all these men, and yet we would find significant divergence of perspective among them as to the age of the earth.

When asked about the age of the earth, R.C. Sproul, the famous Reformed theologian, founder and longtime chairman of Ligonier Ministries, renowned for his radio broadcast "Renewing Your Mind," said, "When people ask me how old the earth is I tell them 'I don't know,' because I don't. And I'll tell you why I don't. In the first place, the Bible does not give us a date of creation. Now it gives us hints and inclinations that would indicate in many cases a young earth. But at the same time you get all this expanding universe and all

this astronomical dating, and triangulation and all that stuff coming from outside the church that makes me wonder... but having said that, that's a long way to say I don't know how old the earth is."

I have life-long friends who believe in The Calendar Day Interpretation of 6, 24 hour periods of creation. In seminary, I was taught the Framework Interpretation at the hands of a brilliant scholar who, I promise you, you would be wisely afraid to confront in an argument. Then there's the Day-Age Interpretation, The Analogical Days Interpretation, and others. I know adherents of every one of these perspectives, and it would never occur to me to anathematize any of them as a heretic. Fools rush in where angels fear to tread. Is it alright to think about these questions and to engage them in polite conversation? Of course! But, please, just remember, Beloved, that if Reformed Christians are still working out the cosmological questions, doesn't that call us to an extra measure of humility and grace to our fellow believers as we each sort out our perspectives? It would seem more commendable to affirm with R.C. Sproul, "I don't know," than to arrogantly affirm what may later prove to be in error. As Keith Mathison sagely affirms: "If the universe turns out to be 6000 years old, that fact will not ultimately conflict with what Scripture actually teaches. If the universe turns out to be billions of years old, that fact will not ultimately conflict with what Scripture actually teaches. We do not need to renounce Christianity in either case." We do not need to renounce each other either.

My heart is for Jesus. My heart is for the word of God. My heart is for the truth. My heart is for orthodox Christian teaching. My heart is also for the unity of the body, the church, specifically Lancaster Presbyterian Church, where the order of the day is still: *In Essentials Unity, In Non-essentials Liberty, In All Things Charity.*

Church will provide: meat, paper products and table settings, lemonade and bottled water



WE NEED YOU

To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good.

1 Corinthians 12:7

If you disappeared one day from your local church, who would notice? If you were absent for an extended period of time, what would your church miss?

God has given every believer at least one gift to use for the good of His body. And while none of us should be irreplaceable in the sense that the church couldn't go on without us, we should be missed if we were absent, because God has gifted us in a specific way at a precise point in time to be uniquely useful in a particular group of people.

But how often do we sit on the sidelines, waiting for others to minister to us when the thrust of Scripture is that God ministers through us? Yes, every single one of us must be ready to receive ministry from others as they use the gifts God has given them for our good. But our default setting should be to give, not only or primarily to receive. The church really doesn't have much space for spectators. Even the youngest among us, be it in faith or in age, has something to contribute.

When we exercise our gifts, we manifest the Spirit's work and power for the common good. Most immediately, that includes the edification of our brothers and sisters in our local assembly, but it also includes witnessing to our friends and neighbors beyond the church walls. While they might be confused and bemused by the very idea of "spiritual gifts," they will understand a compassionate heart. They will respond to hospitality. They will be open to a word of concern or encouragement.

You have something to contribute, uniquely. Yet our ability to participate in God's work should never puff us up, for it is a gift given by the Spirit of God, and it is the Gift-Giver who deserves the praise as we use it to serve His people and His world.

So, assured that to each is given a gift, by God's Spirit, for the common good, be encouraged to pour yourself out rather than holding yourself back. Your church needs what you, through God's Spirit, have to offer. As an old children's song puts it, "There's a work for Jesus none but you can do."[1] What is He asking of you?

The Providence of God and Surprised by Suffering series will be led by Ken O'Connor and will include video lectures by Dr. R.C. Sproul. This study will look at how God providentially controls all things that come to pass fulfilling his purpose for creation in light of the ongoing events, pain, and suffering all around us. We will look at the history and definition of providence, how God exercises His providence in our lives, the "Why" of providence and lastly at the value and comfort that providence brings to our lives.

Lastly, we will look at death and heaven through the eyes of providence and suffering. Examining the journey that we all must take approaching the veil and the beatific vision.

Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Collection

It is time to begin thinking about packing shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child. The collection dates this year are November 13-20. If you bring your boxes to our church, we will be taking them to Eastern Hills Wesleyan, which is the next stop on their journey, on **Sunday November 19**. Summer is a great time to start purchasing your school supplies because they are all on sale. It is also a great time to start thinking about what you would like to put in your boxes.

Here are some suggestions for things to include in your boxes:

School supplies

- Crayons, colored pencils, markers (Preferably Crayola brand items)
- pencil sharpeners, erasers, rulers, glue sticks
- pens and pencils with no business/church advertising logos
- small pads of papers/notebooks
- small calculators
- drawstring backpacks

Other suggested items:

- Flip Flops
- Personal Hygiene items-Toothbrush, Plastic dish and bar of soap, washcloth
- Jump ropes--the longer the better
- Deflated soccer ball, pump, and extra needles
- A sturdy bowl or cup and a spoon or spork
- A plain colored T-shirt
- socks
- stuffed animals or dolls

For older children:

- Gardening/work gloves
- Sewing Kit
- Flashlight-Solar or LED--send extra batteries with the ends taped over Tools

A few items that should **NOT** be included:

- Toothpaste
- Candy and gum (both are no longer allowed and will be removed)
- Anything that requires an explanation--don't send games or crafts with English directions
- Anything that is not brand new
- War Toys
- Anything liquid, including bottles of glue
- anything glass that could break

If you decide to wrap your box after it has been packed, the top and bottom must be wrapped individually. Every shoe box is looked through at the collection center.. The shoe box recipients receive a gospel booklet presented in their own language. Shoe box recipients also receive an invitation to attend a 12 lesson follow-up discipleship program called the Greatest Journey. The cost of **processing each box is \$10.00**. You may include a check for this amount in your shoebox or you may donate this on-line at Samaritanspurse.org and receive a shipping label that you can tape on your box. If you donate on-line, it will also track your box and you can go on-line to Operation Christmas Child, Pack a shoebox, and Label Options. You should be able to see what country your box or boxes went to.

There will be a table set up by the lounge area under the sanctuary where there will be plenty of empty boxes. Help your-self!! Plastic shoe boxes work great as well!! You can also purchase boxes from Samaritan's purse directly if you like. They have 2 kinds--plastic or cardboard. **The website is: Samaritanspurse.org.** If you have any questions, please feel free to call Pat Gerber at 668-2670. Have fun beginning to think about packing your shoe boxes and be in prayer that just the right boy or girl will receive your box or boxes!! I would also ask that if you packed 1 box last year you might consider doing 2 or more boxes this year. Every box counts and there are lots of children around the world who may only receive this simple shoe box as a gift at Christmas!!






