CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR:

"The Reason for the Season"

Tis the season to be Jolly...or is it? I was getting my haircut the other day when a very curious conversation took place. My barber started to share with me his distaste for the Christmas season. All of us are familiar with the preverbal "Grinch" at Christmas but I would venture to guess that few of us have ever actually met him. I certainly hadn't, until now, and he was cutting my hair.

He went on to explain how he hated the Christmas season. In fact, he said that it was his least favorite time of year. He shared with me how everywhere he looked all he could see is happy people and it just drove him crazy and he just can't wait for it to be over.

I listened to his ranting, and I appreciated his honestly, but of everything that he said, what I struggled with most is seeing the joy all over Christmas that he says he can't miss. I left that haircut wondering, "Am I missing something"? "Do I see joy; do I see happy people?" I don't mean to be cynical, in fact I believe I am a very optimistic person, yet when I look around, I see a lot of pain, a lot of loneliness and a lot of messed up priorities.

Why is it that my barber sees happy people everywhere he looks, and I see something totally different? I see people fighting over this year's number one toy at the toy store. I see people arguing over parking spaces at the mall. I see people spending money they don't have to buy things that they don't need. I see stress, unmet expectations, and anxiety.

Where is Jesus in all of this? When we say things like, "Remember the reason for the season" are we referring to going bankrupt just to bring a few fleeting smiles to our family members and friends? I am not sure where the tradition of giving all of these gifts comes from. I have heard that we give gifts because the wise men came to Bethlehem and gave gifts to baby Jesus.

The gold, the frankincense, the myrrh.

But I don't think that it is the reason, because if it were, then we would give gifts to Jesus and not to each other. So why do we give all these gifts? I think it is because we think that that is what will bring us joy. But if that brings us so much joy then why, just a few days after Christmas, are we already working on next year's Christmas wish list?

I love Christmas! I love the traditions that my family has around this holiday. I love the songs, the movies and TV programs. I love the recitals, plays and church programs. And I even love buying a little something for those that I love. But most of all, I love the "real" Reason for the Season. Of all the gifts that are bought and given this holiday season, none can compare to the gift that God gave to us. "For God so loved the world that He gave us His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him will not perish but have everlasting life. John 3:16".

The real gift this year isn't the iPhone, a new Android tablet, a Mercedes-Benz, or whatever else may be on your wish list this year; those gifts don't bring joy, peace or happiness. 
