

As is our custom, we will serve a free supper on Friday evening at 6:00 before the session. BLOOD DRIVE You've seen the promotions for the Red Cross Blood Drive to be held at our church on August 30th from 10:00 – 3:00pm. While we are not the ones who set this drive up, we are allowing the Red Cross to hold a previously scheduled drive here. I know it's not the best time for most of you, but there will be some that are available during that time and I encourage you to donate and help save lives. Perhaps you have never donated blood before and have some questions, like:

- Who can give blood? You must be at least 16 years of age (<u>must have written parental consent</u>). At age 17, you may give independently. There is no upper age limit. All donors at Carter BloodCare must bring a valid photo ID. Donors must weigh at least 110 pounds. Potential donors must be feeling well and healthy on the day of donating.
- Where does my blood go? Blood donated with Carter BloodCare goes to patients across North, Central and East
 Texas our friends, family and neighbors facing emergencies every day such as older adults with age-related
 health issues, mothers experiencing difficulties during childbirth, major accident and emergency patients,
 children with anemia, and many others who depend on an available community blood supply. We serve more
 than 200 medical facilities in 50+ counties with the blood products needed to keep people healthy and well.
- Can I donate if I've recently had COVID-19? You must wait until 10 days after your symptoms clear from your COVID-19 infection to donate.
- How long does it take? The entire whole blood donation process, from registration to post-donation refreshments, takes less than an hour. The actual blood draw takes 5 to 10 minutes. Donors are encouraged to make and honor appointments to avoid long delays.

- How will I feel after I give blood? Most people feel fine after giving blood. A unit of blood (500ml) is less than a pint, and the average adult body contains 10 to 12 pints of blood. Your body makes new blood constantly, and the plasma (liquid portion of blood) you give will be replaced within 2-3 days.
 - Eating a well-balanced meal and drinking plenty of fluids within 24 hours before donating will help you recover.
 - o Drinking water and non-alcoholic liquids after giving also helps your body replenish lost fluids.
 - You should avoid drinking alcohol before and 24 hours after giving.
 - Strenuous activity should be avoided for at least 24 hours after giving. If you have a hazardous or strenuous job, you should give at the end of your work shift.
 - Smokers should refrain from smoking for 30 minutes after giving.
 - o Avoid lifting or pulling for 24 hours with the arm used for the donation.
