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## Discussion Guide

1. What stood out to you in today's gathering?
2. In Luke 15:1-2 we see two groups present: tax collectors and sinners drawing near to Jesus, and Pharisees and scribes grumbling about it. What do you know about these two groups? Through the three parables that follow, which group is Jesus inviting into the joy of the kingdom, and which group is He confronting and correcting in their attitude?
3. How does Jesus's willingness to be personally involved with tax collectors and sinners display God's character?
4. Commentator Klyne Snodgrass says "If the kingdom is present and forgiveness is being dispensed, even if evil is still in the world, joy should characterize those who recognize what is happening... Joy is not an optional feature of the faith, nor can it be attained by smiling more and singing louder. It must emerge from an awareness of the mercy and forgiveness of God enacted in the kingdom." How do the parables of the lost sheep, lost coin, and lost son invite us into that kind of joy? What would it look like for us to live more aware of God's mercy this week?
5. What is one takeaway from today's message that you believe the Lord is prompting you to live out in your life?

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
