


Signals from Ted & Dawn Siemens Serving with TWR

Imagine my (Dawn) delight when we were asked to come to England to care for our granddaughters while their parents would go to a conference in Greece. This was an answer to a prayer or a longing that I didn't realize I had. Not only would we have time with our son's family, but it would also provide the chance to fly to our former host countries of Cyprus and the Netherlands.

Since transferring back to South Dakota for Ted to work with TWR remotely, I developed a sense of isolation. For almost 31 years Ted and I had both been a part of TWR. Though I had two very young children upon our arrival on Guam, I happily helped at the office by answering listener mail from China. Later, I got involved with Project Hannah (Now called TWR Women of Hope). In 2001 we transitioned to Europe and lived in the Netherlands. I immediately began language learning where I met immigrants from the very countries that TWR's media programs were reaching out to. Meanwhile, I joined staff meetings and remained involved. I was also involved in TWR's Member Care Media. Eventually, I was reintroduced to Project Hannah/Women of Hope in Europe and became the coordinator for all of Europe & CAMENA. Continuing to serve with Women of Hope when we moved to Vienna, I also had the opportunity to meet women who had sought refuge in Austria. I learned first-hand about their culture and circumstances. The same thing happened when I moved to Cyprus.

In each country, my life involved TWR people – colleagues and their spouses. We didn't all go to the same church or live in the same neighbourhoods, but we were doing life away from our passport countries - together. We prayed together, celebrated birthdays, anniversaries, and encouraged or comforted one another. Our cultural backgrounds varied, but we shared a passion for sharing the gospel via media. I was a part of a team that was right next door! This had been my life until April of 2023.

On November 13, we flew to Manchester, England and based ourselves there for the next month. We flew to Cyprus and then later to the Netherlands. Spending time in our former host countries was the balm I needed. And watching Justin, Brittany, Kennedy and Hailee adjust to life in their new host country reminded me that God is always at work! He is working in and through us wherever we live. Arriving back in South Dakota on December 13, I felt refreshed. Though I long to live overseas, God has been teaching me that this earth is not my home. He is!
