

Funeral Luncheon

Social Time

Many families find it meaningful to gather with friends after a funeral service for food and conversation.

Due to COVID precautions, funeral luncheons are not currently being offered in our church fellowship hall.

See below for recommendations for alternative options for social gathering following a funeral service.

Social times can also take place at venues that can more easily handle larger groups of people, like the Virginia Elks Club, the Virginia Serviceman's Club, The Senior Center, or the Mt. Iron Community Center.

Some families also choose to gather in a local park or reserved pavilion, weather permitting. Reservations for outdoor settings must be made separately with parks or city authorities.

Music

All music selected for the funeral service should reflect faith, hope, and trust in the grace of God. Since the funeral service is a worship service in the Christian tradition, the music must be religious in nature. Popular songs that are not religious in spirit can be played during visitation or luncheon time.

Congregational singing is highly encouraged, allowing worshippers to sing their faith. Favorite hymns of the deceased or the family may be included. Available hymnals are: the red *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*, the blue *With One Voice*, the gold *Contemporary Song*, and the tan *Hymns for the Family of God*. Some *ELW* hymns popular at funeral services are named below. Soloists and other musicians may also be included in funeral services.

Christian Burial

Why a Funeral Service?

- + The death of a loved one causes many different feelings in us. A funeral service creates a time and place when these feelings of grief can be named, honored, and expressed in healthy ways.
- + A funeral service gathers together family, friends, and community for mutual support at a time when it is most needed.
- + A funeral service provides an opportunity to give thanks for the life of the deceased.
- + A funeral service offers comfort and hope to people through God's Holy Word, prayer, and song. It helps people move ahead with their lives following the loss of a loved one.

Jesus Christ

We see the grace of God most clearly in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In his living, we learn how to live. In his death on the cross, we learn about God's forgiveness and grace for each of us. In his resurrection from the dead on Easter morning, Jesus opened a way to eternal life in heaven. Our faith in Jesus Christ is what gives us hope at a time of death.

Funeral Service/Memorial Service

If the deceased's body is present in a casket, the worship service is called a funeral service. If the body is not present, the service is called a memorial service. In both instances, the worship service is the same. The focus is on God's grace, with attention given to remembering the deceased. For the purpose of this guide, all references are to *funeral services*.

The Committal

An integral part of the funeral service is the Committal, which takes place at the place of burial. Because the Committal gives finality and reality to the funeral process, it serves the family and friends best when it is done before the social time. If the weather is inclement, or services on weekends make it difficult for a graveside Committal, the Committal may be held at the close of the funeral service in the sanctuary or the funeral home chapel. Arrangements may also be made with the pastor through the funeral director for the Committal to be held at a later date.

Worship Guidelines

Remembrance of Holy Baptism

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism is God's gift to us of forgiveness, resurrection, and new life. The funeral service usually begins with a Remembrance of Baptism, because our hope as Christians is based on God's mercy and grace first received at Baptism. If the deceased person was not baptized, the service may begin with an acknowledgement of God's mysterious work through the Holy Spirit.

Holy Communion

The Sacrament of Holy Communion is an essential part of worship services in the Lutheran tradition. The family may choose to have Holy Communion be part of a funeral service, but it is not required. The Sacrament must be offered to everyone. Some guests may belong to congregations which forbid them to participate in the Sacrament.

Pall

A white pall is used to cover the casket or urn during the service as a sign of God's mercy and grace that covers us even in death. The pall reminds us that we are all equal and loved in God's eyes.

Remembrances

The family may choose to have one or two family members or close friends share some thoughts, feelings, and remembrances about the deceased in the first part of the funeral service. The total time available for this is ten minutes, and speakers must commit themselves to this time constraint. An open call for remembrances is most appropriate at a reception or other luncheon gathering.

Pastor

The pastor of Gethsemane is responsible for leading funeral services. The day and time of a funeral service must fit the schedule of the pastor and the calendar of the congregation, in addition to the preferences of the family and the availability of the funeral home. Therefore, it is important that the pastor be involved with all funeral arrangements as early as possible. The pastor does not charge a fee for members, but will accept an honorarium for their services. Commonly this amount is \$150-200 (this is often paid through the funeral home). If not paid through the funeral home, payment is made directly to the pastor.

Scripture

Bible verses that are personal favorites of the deceased or the family are encouraged for funeral services. If the deceased read the Bible at home, there may be some favorites highlighted in their Bible. Generally, one or two Old and/or New Testament passages are read by friends or family members, and then the Gospel is read by the Pastor. Here are some popular verses relevant for funeral services:
