

Greetings,

Grace and peace to you from fellow laborers in Christ. Thank you for taking the time to read through this packet. Our intention in putting this together is to introduce ourselves to you and share the passion God has placed in our hearts for the people of Togo, West Africa. God faithfully equipped us, in big and small ways, for full-time ministry in missions throughout our lives.

Anna: Raised in a Christian home, I grew up hearing about the truths of the Gospel and accepted Jesus as my personal Savior at the age of four. While attending summer camp as a 13 year old, I, devoted my life to serving God—no matter where that took me and however He chose to use me. Opportunities to go on short term missions trips to Salt Lake City, Mexico, France, and South Africa over the years grew in me a heart for missions, specifically in Africa. After receiving my Bachelor of Science in Bible and Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degrees, I pursued medical missions opportunities, which ultimately led me to ABWE where I was appointed as a career missionary to serve in Togo, West Africa. I served there from 2014-2016 and it was during this time that I met another missionary nurse, Mike Cole.

Mike: I was born and raised in the Philippines as the son of ABWE missionaries, so my love of culture and desire to see the nations come to know the Lord has grown in me from a very young age. I, too, came to know the Lord as my personal Savior at the age of four and grew in my faith and love of God over the years. After attending Cedarville University, where I received my BSN, I joined the U.S. Navy, serving with them for nearly a decade. During my time in the Navy I was able to travel the world while also serving others through my nursing skills. But my desire to serve through medical missions never left me so, after getting out of the Navy in 2014, I contacted ABWE. They led me to the Hospital of Hope in Mango, Togo where I served short-term from 2014-2016. During that time, the Lord made it clear to me that He was calling me to return as a career missionary to Mango and I was appointed by ABWE in 2016.

We married in early 2017, completed prefield ministry requirements and support raising and left for the field in August 2017. After spending about a year in language school, we arrived in Mango once again, this time as a husband and wife team. During our first term on the field, our family grew with the addition of two sons! Benaiah was born in 2018 and Judah followed in 2020. Due to these two blessed additions, as well as supporter changes over the last four years, we are currently under-supported and seeking those eager to partner with us in this exciting ministry in northern Togo!

While in Togo we have fallen in love with the Togolese people: their generosity, kindness, hospitality, positivity despite incredible poverty, and also see firsthand their great physical and spiritual needs. Standing on the hospital property and feeling the dirt between our toes, we have been able to witness lives changed for eternity on this plot of land. We are excited to one day introduce you to the many Togolese in Heaven who surrendered to Christ through the ministry of the Hospital of Hope! We are both humbled and excited that God has called us to be a part of what He is accomplishing here. He is working mighty wonders and we feel blessed to have a front row seat to the display of His life-transforming power in Mango, Togo!

As a result, we are excited to be one of the instruments God uses to extend their ministries beyond their doors and around the globe! Now we are looking for others who will join our team. - nearly half of the population of Togo is under 15 years of age
- every year millions of Africans die needlessly from preventable and treatable diseases
- the doctor-to-patient ratio in the United States is 256 for every 100,000 people while in Togo it is a staggering 5 for every 100,000
- only one in 20 women has access to a C-section when necessary







- the opportunity is unprecedent ea
- the predominantly Muslim community in northern Togo approached ABWE about building a hospital in their area as a result of the reputation of ABWE's Hapital Baptiste Biblique in Tsiko, Togo
- the Hospital of Hope in Mango, Togo is the response to that need and invitation
- God has opened a door into an unreached and closed area of the 10/40 Window through medical missions
- due to our close proximity to the surrounding African nations, we have the opportunity to reach beyond borders without leaving Togo, serving patients from Ghana, Benin, Burkina Faso, Cote d'Ivoire, and even as far as Guinea

{ facts about Togo }

Area: 21,925 sq mi (56,785 sq km); about the size of the western half of the lower peninsula of MI

Population: 8.2 million people (2020 est.); made up of 37 tribes—largest and most important are Ewe, Mina, and Kabré

Capital: Lomé

Geography: located in West Africa; bordered by Burkina Faso to the north, Benin to the east, Ghana to the west, and the Atlantic Ocean to the south; gently rolling savanna in the north, central hills, southern plateau, low coastal plain

Climate: tropical; hot, humid in south; semiarid in north (Mango sees temperatures as high as 145° during the hot season); two rainy seasons in the south (Sep-Nov and Apr-Jun) and one in the north (Jun-Sept)

Language: French (official); Ewe and Mina (two major African languages in the south), Kabiyé and Dagomba (two major African languages in the north); Anufo (most significant African language spoken in and around Mango)

Religion: Indigenous beliefs 51% (including animism, fetishism, and voodoo), Christian (including Roman Catholic and Protestant) 29% (primarily in southern Togo), Muslim 20%; in the north where Mango is located, Islam is the predominant religion and Christianity is nearly non-existent

Economics: Togo depends heavily on agriculture, which provides livelihood for over 65% of the population. Cocoa, coffee, and cotton are the most significant cash crops exported. Togo is also one of the world's largest producers of phosphate.

- infant mortality rate: 7.9% of live births
- maternal mortality rate: 570 deaths/100,000 live births
- life expectancy at birth: 58 years
- physicians: 5 per 100,000 people
- hospital beds: 85 beds/ 100,000 people

As you perused the statistics on the previous page we hope you were struck by the overwhelming medical needs in Togo. As nurses at the Hospital of Hope (HoH) we have been able to help meet these needs through compassionate and quality health care. As we live within this culture we are bombarded daily, not only with the immense medical needs in the region, but also with the people's profound

needs. Reminders of their enslavement to Islam are seen in the burgas and hijabs worn by the women, by the kufis and robes worn by the men, by the call to prayer rung from the minarets five times a day, by those often seen kneeling on prayer mats facing toward Mecca, by their greetings and their drive to do good works to earn the favor of Allah.

We were privileged to be the Hospital of Hope when it opened in 2015. We can tell you countless stories of lives ravaged by sickness, disease, and poverty. They have contracted terminal diseases and are dying. In the state of poverty in which they live, there is little hope that their life will extend beyond a few months to a few years. Looking into their eyes as they sit before us, the science of medicine is put in its proper place. While we may be able to give pills and care to extend life for a while, the ultimate question remains...what then? When this life has gone, as it inevitably will, where will they spend their eternity? We see medical work through a different lens now. To some extent we can treat disease, patch up wounds, extend a person's life by months, years, or even decades. But the driving force for us has become, "What then?!" Whether young or old, sick or well, rich or poor, from Asia, Africa, Europe, or North America, the same question remains. Where will these beautiful people spend their eternity? Have they heard the saving truths of God's Word? Most here in northern Togo have never heard that a Savior died to so that they could be freed from the bondage of sin. This is why we go.

Community Health Evangelism

As an extension of the hospital ministry we are currently beginning to get up and going a ministry that takes health education along with evangelism into the villages around Mango to broaden our opportunities to share about the hope found in Christ alone

Christian Education

This ministry is two-fold: a nursing school and a Christian primary school. Our team has trained all of our Togolese nurses internally through our own on-site nursing program. While learning nursing concepts and practices, they are also taught the Word of God and discipled by our missionary staff. ABWE has also partnered with a local church to open the first Christian school in our area! The second school year has just begun.

- Ministry Roles

- Mike serves not only as a **nurse in the inpatient wards** at the Hospital of Hope, but also fulfills the role of **nursing supervisor**, along with a Togolese counterpart
- Mike recently completed his Masters of Science in Nursing (MSN) with a focus on Nurse Education through Cedarville University. Next term he will be transitioning into a **training role** in our on-site nursing school in addition to his role as a bedside nurse.
- we are involved in leading a weekly Bible study in a neighboring village
- on top of her primary ministry of raising our children, Anna leads the team's **Member Care Committee** that seeks to maintain the emotional, spiritual, physical, and mental health of our team members in order to increase longevity in ministry service
- we are also involved in getting a new ministry, **Community Health Evangelism** (CHE) off the ground in the hopes that this will reach into the lives of those in neighboring villages through evangelism as well as basic health education to improve health outcomes; the goal is to use health education and healthcare to open doors for the Gospel in the surrounding areas and ultimately plant new churches
