A Place for Everything; and Everything in Its Place

Have you ever needed a tool that you knew you owned, but could not find it in the drawer, tool chest or cart? Maybe you started out collecting one tool at a time as you could afford each of them, until your original, simple tool box could no longer organize or even hold them all. Or have you looked for a particular size of baking pan or kitchen utensil, but could not find it when you needed it? For some people, spending money on tool storage and drawer organizers is not as enjoyable as adding a wonderful new tool itself, but even those not fond of organizing often realize there is value in sparing oneself needless frustration and wasted time finding tools (or kitchen equipment). Maybe you have even bought a second or third set of identical tools, because you could not find the first set! There are costs to not being organized.

God has provided his children with many spiritual tools in the 66 books he guided over 40 men to write. There are 1,189 chapters in those books, written to serve a wide variety of functions. People lump the Old Testament into categories of History, Poetry and Prophecy (which serves at least as a large grouping), but those 3 categories are like having just 3 deep drawers for 929 tools! Would you like to toss all your wrenches into 1 drawer, screwdrivers and sockets into another drawer, and your pliers, cutters, snips, and powered tools into the third? A better way is to separate a little more, and identify some tools that you will likely be reaching for more often, so you don't have to dig and dig every time. How many times do we not know what to tell someone who needs some spiritual help, because we don't know what tool to use, or where to find it?

The following is a list of common spiritual tools known as **VICs** (Very Important Chapters). You don't have to accumulate and sort all 1,189 different tools in order to do some practical work. Think of how you get comfortable with tools. Start by learning how to identify what a tool is used for and where to find it, but start with only a basic dozen or so tools. Read these chapters, perhaps one per day, and the following day glance back over it for a brief, familiarizing review of the previous day's chapter, then read the next.

MESSAGE FROM PASTOR HENRY T. KOCH

Memorize the book name and chapter number that goes with its content. You will be skipping 98% of the chapters to learn how to use the most common ones, just as a person standing in front of a professional mechanic's thousand tools has to discover certain tools are common. But in a month, you can have some tools and a mental picture where to find them.

Following this handy reference list is the same list but scrambled into a challenge. See if you can match the chapter to what it teaches. There could easily be other chapters nominated to a favorite list of spiritual tools--but start here. Perhaps next month we can look at some VIPs (Very Important Passages).

MISSION FESTIVAL 2025

August 3

Guest Preacher: Rev. Luke Wolfgramm, Head of Europe Missions

On August 3, Rev. Luke Wolfgramm (accompanied by his lovely wife Jennifer) came to Friedens to preach and give a mission presentation on WELS Mission happenings in Europe.

A Delicious Potluck followed the Mission Presentation!

Highlights of the Mission Festival Presentation

- Pastor Luke Wolfgramm and his wife Jennifer live in an apartment in Leipzig, Germany (where Bach worked). They travel 6 months out of the year. They do a lot of Pastoral mentoring and teaching. He thanked us for our Mission support.
- London/UK: There are 8 million people living in London. They planted a church 3 years ago there. There are a lot of empty churches there, though. There are also Christian churches that are growing.
- Europe Churches: Pastor Wolfgramm spoke a little about all of WELS UK churches.
- Pastor Wolfgramm and his wife are staying in the US till September 10. Then, they will start traveling to the different mission fields, as they teach about Jesus.
- Pastor Wolfgramm will be having an Evangelism workshop in Leipzig soon—"How to share Jesus with people."
- Pastor Koch asked Pastor Wolfgramm what he thinks American Christians' weaknesses are. Pastor Wolfgramm replied that we move really quickly through our services. Other countries are slow-moving in worship.
- Pastor Wolfgramm and his wife Jennifer raised their children in Russia, where they have "state" churches. Their children now live in the U.S. They miss Russia.
- Pastor Wolfgramm said that they regularly sing up to 6 hymns in a worship service in Germany.
- Albania has outlawed all churches.


Church Chicken has found a place to roost in the evenings—a window of the church in the courtyard area.



- 1. Pastor led a Devotion on the Parable of the Fig Tree, from the Gospel of Luke. The fig tree in the Parable was in a vineyard. Was it not where it was supposed to be? Not being fruitful? The Gardener is the interceder in the story, asking to give it more time to be fruitful.
- 2. Pastor led in prayer.

Czech Out New Prague.

- 1. Czech Out New Prague (August 7): It was reported that 69 filled out info for the cookbook drawing.
- 2. It was thought that 3 people wanted further info on our church.
 - a. What is the best way to contact them? Discussion on how best to contact.

Pastor's Report (Reference Pastor's Report on Literature Table).

- 1. Music. Choir, Grand Piano, Jan Manthe donates her playing, Patrick Schaefer accompanies choir. Pastor went over how the grand piano is used.
- 2. Rightnow Media is being canceled. There are still a few days to view programming.
- 3. VBS (August 6, 11 a.m. 2 p.m.). We are going to go through extra Sunday School lessons for bible lessons. Pastor went through what is included in VBS. We are doing a reset.
 - a. Age-appropriate Bible Lessons will be used.
- 4. Sunday School resumes on September 7; Catechism resumes September 10; Last day of Sunday School will be May 31.
- 5. Youth Bike Trip will be planned for September.
- 6. Bible Information Classes are being done remotely.
- 7. Pastor went through adult Bible Class topics.

Elders' Report.

- 1. Josh went over the worship attendance.
- 2. A key event was a new-member lunch, where we welcomed new members.
- 3. VBS: We are looking for volunteers.
- 4. A member requested ending ushering. It was decided to continue ushering.
- 5. Mission Festival (August 3).
- 6. Pastor's Vacation.
- 7. Next Council/Elder Meeting will be August 14, at 6:30.

Outreach Committee Report.

1. Czech Out New Prague (August 7): We could use more volunteers. We will be giving away cookbooks and 9V batteries.

Treasurer's Report.

- 1. The Treasurer's Report was reviewed. (Pam was not able to be present.) There is a declining balance in our checking account—anywhere from \$2,000 to \$11,000. When you combine all the accounts, we are only down \$4,000. Overall consideration of our investment fund, and all the accounts over the past year, the balances went down only \$1,000. We should always be good stewards.
 - Sometimes, there are swings in donations. Some people contribute semi-annually, sometimes quarterly, etc. Our deficit has been fairly steady.
 - b. Our expenses continue to go up.
- 2. The investment Fund has been growing. At some point, we'll have to take out some money; however, we want to leave our funds in the fund to make more money.
- 3. The expenses vary. Some expenses are quarterly and some are monthly. Contributions vary, too.
- 4. The Audit Committee did an audit and everything checked out. Pam has done a tremendous job.

Trustees' Report.

1. Steeple Leaks: Tuck-pointing, was mentioned and will be covered in the new business segment of today's Voters' Meeting.


New Business

Fixing Leaks Around Steeples.

1. We did discover a leak in the 3rd and 4th steeples. Bid was given for \$4,600 (pictures passed out) to replace small flat roofs around both steeples. The work will be done during the next month.

Tuck-Pointing the Church and Parsonage.

A good portion of the church has already been tuck-pointed. Nieman Roofing is going to repair the 3rd and 4th steeples. Tuck-pointing bids were received.



- Discussion on tuck-pointing.
- c. We received two bids for the tuck-pointing: \$27,500 and \$31,000.
 - i. Question from Hank Meyer: On the tuck-pointing, do they have to seal it after that? The whole church was supposed to be sealed every so often. Jeff: The church was tuck-pointed and sealed about 10 or so years ago. Hank: After you tuck-point, is there a few years' wait to seal it? Jeff: Yes. Will: One of the bids calls for pressure washing. Are they going to spray off the sealant? Or has it degraded off? Keith: This is really two issues. We'll move on getting bids for sealant later to protect our investment. Dave Tietz: Bids are similar. He would like to go with someone local. Jeff: Jeff answered that he has used R & S before. New owner, but same crew (they are good).
- d. Jeff talked about tuck-pointing. You wait a year or two and see how it's performed. A slight wind can push rain right into the building. There could be a flashing problem, too, so that can be found and repaired when they are doing the tuck-pointing. The major problem is the balcony leak. Even at the parsonage, there is shifting and some stress cracks.
- e. Keith explained the proposed repairs. R & S seems like a top-notch company. No guarantees.
- f. The intent is to have a vote to proceed with the tuck-pointing. If work is approved, another bid will be requested.
- g. Holman Masonry was recommended by Govara Insulation (great company).
- h. Dave reminded that we just spent half a million dollars on our worship area and we should protect that with fixing the outside.
- i. It was determined that painting wasn't necessary at this time.
- j. Keith mentioned that there were comments from non-voting members.
- k. There was a motion and a second to proceed with the tuck-pointing. We can go with raised hands or paper ballots.
- I. Will recommended an amendment to the motion. Will believes that we should take a closer look at the leaks. We could go with this first motion and vote on that. If that passes, then have the Exec. Council review both bids and decide on which company to go with.
- m. Further Discussion. Jeff: Does the exec. Committee have a recommendation on how to pay for this? The Exec. Council said that we can take out of the investment account or do some fund raising. Keith said that they'll watch the checking account balances.
- n. Keith motioned for going ahead with the tuck-pointing of the church and the parsonage. There was a show of hands for tuck-pointing: 15 ayes and 1 nay. The motion for tuck-pointing passes.
- o. R & S Tuck-pointing was recommended by Jeff. It is not uncommon for closer looks at the project while the work is being done.
 - i. Jeff Heine motioned to go with R & S and to allow a \$5,000 contingency for additional work required. All those in favor. All were in favor. Motion passed.
- Keith said we will go ahead with R & S Tuck-Pointing.

Pavilion (Shelter) Cement Remove & Replace.

- 1. Cracked Cement: We received two bids to repair the cracked concrete.
 - a. Steve Kotek gave a bid (\$10,000 for removal and replacement).
 - b. Discussion: Regarding the trees that caused the problem, the oak is not there anymore, per Russ Meyer.
 - c. Pastor commented on the cracked cement. It can be "shaved" down to reduce the trip hazard. This could be looked at, said Keith.
 - d. The pavilion is about 40 years old. There is a safety hazard here.
 - e. There is tiling around there, but it is about 3 feet away from the perimeter of the cement. You just have to be careful when digging.
 - f. There was a motion to get the cement removed and replaced. It was seconded. All were in favor. Motion passed.
 - g. There was a motion for Steve Kotek to go ahead with the work. Motion was seconded. All were in favor. Motion carries.

Exec. Council Spending Limit.

- 1. The Exec. Council recommended that the Bylaws stay the same (\$5,000).
 - a. A motion was made by Larry Bowen to raise the spending limit to \$10,000.
 - i. Jeff shared that the Council needs to keep transparent in their spending. It has been very rare that more than \$5,000 was needed. There is always the option of calling a special meeting. Hank shared that \$5,000 was plenty. Will saw no reason to change this amount. Keith overviewed comments, including that there has been inflation.
 - ii. The \$10,000 will not go forward.
 - b. There was a motion to maintain the \$5,000 spending limit. It was seconded. All were in favor. The motion carries.

Pastor's Salary.

- 1. Pastor said that the parsonage has been a great blessing.
- 2. Pam Tietz provided a detailed breakout of what the pastor's salary is.
 - a. Current Salary: \$87,107, plus over a benefit package of health insurance, pension and Parsonage.
 - b. The Council recommendation was made for 3%.
 - c. We've always maintained a steady increase.
 - d. Discussion.
 - e. Comments: Pastor has great performance. Should his performance be separate from his salary?
 - f. Jeff made a motion to increase Pastor's base salary by 3% to make \$89,721/year. This was seconded and the motion carries.
