Acts 2:41-47

⁴¹ So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added. ⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

⁴³ Awe came upon everyone because many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. ⁴⁴ All who believed were together and had all things in common; ⁴⁵ they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds^[i] to all, as any had need. ⁴⁶ Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home^[k] and ate their food with glad and generous^[l] hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.



Key Insights


- Historical Context: This is the birth of the Christian church after Pentecost.
- The Spirit-filled community lived radically different from the surrounding Roman culture.
- Theological Themes:
 - Unity in diversity.
 - Radical sharing of resources.
 - Worship rooted in joy and community.
 - Witness that attracts others.



Exegesis of Acts 2:41–47

- **Verse 41:** 3,000 added in one day the Spirit is moving in big ways. (Growth through receiving the Word)
- Verse 42: They stayed rooted in teaching, fellowship, meals, and prayer. (Devotion to teaching, fellowship, breaking bread, and prayer)
- Verse 43: God's power and awe filled the people.
- **Verses 44–45:** They practiced radical economic sharing (Shared resources, economic justice, caring for the poor).
- Verses 46–47: Worship, joy, favor with people, and steady growth.




The Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations
