Dear Friends in Christ:


Recently a dear friend shared a quote which I believe appeared on Facebook. I really thought it was so good I wanted to share this with everyone. The author is Dennis Carpenter.

GOOD SHEPHERD VESTRY

The vestry met on Tuesday, September 26th. Tom Curtin presented a marketing plan for Good Shepherd. The marketing committee will coordinate with Invite, Welcome and Connect (IWC) and the vestry regarding our strategic plan. The vestry's goal is to grow the parish by one percent by December of 2024. Our target audiences are young families, new residents, and lapsed members. The marketing committee will develop different key messages to each of these target audiences. We will use the IWC process to implement these strategies.

Bruce Dunn was absent but sent the following information regarding last month's income and expenses: Good Shepherd collected \$17,000 in August from pledges and rental income. We lost approximately \$5,000 on the Diocesan Investment account in interest last month but have gained \$23,700 YTD. Expenses exceed income year-to-date by \$1165. If you are not up-to-date on your pledge, please catch up as you are able.

Bruce and Dick Robinson have developed an Expense Management Process document to clarify the procedure for submitting and getting approval for expenses. I will share this document with ministry chairs through our vestry liaisons. I will also be amending the payment voucher form to coincide with this document. For those of you who make purchases for Good Shepherd, please contact Debbie (she will forward the information to Bruce) before you purchase and use the tax- exempt form when making a purchase.

The gutters for St. Andrews have arrived and will be installed this fall. Tom Yourch has agreed to do an evaluation of the structural work needed on the chapel, free of charge.

Chris Nuccitelli has been working diligently on the Columbarium. We have purchased two more units of twenty-four niches, which are being installed. The price for a niche is \$800. This includes a brass plaque with your name, birth and death dates. If you price burial plots in other locations, you will realize that this is a great value. If you are interested in purchasing a niche, please contact Fr. Lance.

We reviewed a proposal by Dunbar and Dunbar to clean the parish hall floor. We would like to get a second quote, itemized to break out the costs for the parish hall and the hallways, before proceeding with the project.

Tom Yourch and Annie Bishop have agreed to work on the kitchen cleanup. Once we have the kitchen cleaned, Pete Rothfuss will apply for a permit to allow us to use the kitchen for in-parish events. The permit is free of charge.

Thank you to all the vestry, Bruce and Chris and all the other parishioners who work tirelessly to make Good Shepherd a great place to worship.



Stitchers started in person with a wonderful turnout. We will continue creating hats, either by sewing from fleece or knit or crochet. Last year we made at least 90 fleece hats for charity. There is much to do to set up and organize our new space but we will concentrate on completing our hat project in October and November. We will continue to put together kits for both projects so they can go home and be sewn together as time permits. We will continue to gather ideas for charity so please bring your ideas and join us any Thursday morning starting at 10:00. RABBI PETER STEIN WILL SPEAK AT OCTOBER'S ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAM

As part of a new connection to Temple B'rith Kodesh and the Rochester Jewish community, Rabbi Peter Stein will be with us at Good Shepherd on October 19 at 11:00am (the location in the church to be determined). The senior rabbi at Temple B'rith Kodesh, he did his undergraduate studies at Cornell University and completed the Jewish Leaders Program at the Kellogg School of Management at Northwestern University. He was ordained and earned an MA in Hebrew Literature at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, studying in Jerusalem and New York City.

His presentation will offer an overview of Jewish history and an introduction to modern Jewish practice. This will be an opportunity to learn more about Judaism and to compare Jewish and Christian beliefs and practices. This session will serve as a foundation to engage in a conversation about the urgent crisis of antisemitism and what we can do in response. Antisemitism in Rochester and across the country is rising at a dramatic rate and there is a need for everyone to come together to stop the hatred and violence.

Rabbi Stein's talk will draw upon his work in Rochester with a number of community organizations, including serving as an adjunct faculty member at the Colgate Rochester Crozier Divinity School. He is a founding Steering Committee member of the Religious Action Center of New York, a part of the ROC ACTS Clergy Caucus, and a past member of Planned Parenthood's national Clergy Advocacy Board. He sits on several interfaith clergy associations and has had a longstanding engagement with issues of LGBTQ equality and poverty.

As a follow-up to his program, parishioners are invited to a tour given by Rabbi Stein and continued learning about Judaism at Temple B'rith Kodesh on November 10 at 5PM. Then at 6PM, you are welcome to attend the Friday night Sabbath worship. A third program to be determined is envisioned for sometime in Spring 2024. Please watch for details.



Bishop Michael Curry Announces New Episcopal Evangelism Program Coming this Fall to Good Shepherd! By Dawn Wilkins and Tom Curtin

A letter from Bishop Michael Curry:

Brothers and sisters.

We are about to embark on a journey of Invite Welcome Connect, a ministry designed to help Episcopalians engage in the deep work of evangelism. How do we define evangelism? I believe that this program of Invite Welcome Connect gives us a way forward.

As Episcopalians we tend to be shy and polite. We are not pushy—that's not our way. And I don't think that we need to pretend to be that way. We need to be who we are. Invite Welcome Connect is a way for God to guide people in sharing their stories in ways that are authentic and genuine.

I participated in this program as the bishop of North Carolina, and our diocese was very involved in the ministry. This is a wonderful program, but it's more than simply a program. It helps inculcate a way of life that reflects the way of welcome of Jesus of Nazareth, the Jesus who says, "Come unto me all ye who are weary and heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

Invite Welcome Connect is something we as Episcopalians can do. It's a way of evangelism that reflects who we are, that doesn't have us trying to be somebody we aren't, but actually calls us to be exactly who we are in Jesus Christ, and to invite, and welcome, and connect others to that life-giving reality.

I encourage all Episcopalians to embrace Invite Welcome Connect as one way to live into the Jesus Movement. God bless you, God keep you, and let's keep this Jesus Movement going.

By preparing and discreetly delivering a meal to your doorstep, or if invited in for a visit, our volunteers respect confidentiality, and your wishes. Please call us if anyone from Good Shepherd could use these resources... or if you would like to join us in preparing meals, delivering & visiting, have a new idea for this ministry, or want to volunteer your help in another way!

We use an on-line organizational service called takethemameal.com. Volunteers give their email address to Debra Nelson. When one of our church families need a hand, an email comes from buttler1@hotmail.com but you respond to the takethemameal.com website, choosing the date and recording the meal you plan to make. Ideas, addresses and phone numbers, dietary restrictions, and so on are all included on the site. You will also receive a reminder from takethemameal.com the day before.

ANYONE can contribute a meal. If you eat supper, you can bring supper! Our "guests" generally enjoy simple, homemade cooking, but if you would prefer to get take-out or buy a prepared meal – just make it easy and do whatever you are doing for yourself. It doesn't need to be expensive or elaborate, either. One of our customers loves grilled cheese and tomato soup! We have helped people of all ages, from compound fractures to temporary elder care. It is a rewarding ministry when you have the chance to meet someone new and make their day much easier. And when you visit someone, you have known for years and renew the friendship.
