		a. Matthew was a government servant, a collector of tribute and tolls. He was part of that despised and hated group in Israel who had joined hands with the Roman Gentiles to serve.	
		**Matthew had left the distinctiveness of his nation by going over to the enemy (dogs).	
		b. Matthew actually had become an ant. Each day he would sit by his table on the side of the main highway, where each caravan had to stop and pay taxes-dues. No doubt, he had to keep an accurate account for the Romans and king. There were goals and anything collected above went into the of the tax collector. When the governor or officials came to examine the records, they had to be right!
