Philippians

Chapter 2:1-4

- I. **Philippians 2:1** If there be therefore any consolation in Christ, if any comfort of love, if any fellowship of the Spirit, if any bowels and mercies,
 - a. "If" begins an argument similar to Colossians 3:1-2
 - b. "therefore"
 - i. Goes back to Philippians 1:27-30...specifically 27
 - ii. **Philippians 1:27**²⁷Only let your conversation be as it becometh the gospel of Christ: that whether I come and see you, or else be absent, I may hear of your affairs, that ye stand fast in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the gospel;

c. Consolation of Christ

- i.Consolation- Greek word *paraklesis* Strongs Con.imploration, hortation, solace:—comfort, consolation, exhortation, intreaty.
- ii. The idea of calling near or alongside. Consoling supporting others.

d. Comfort of Love

- i.Comfort- Greek word paramythion- Strongs Con.consolation (properly, concretely):—comfort.
- ii. Gives the idea of calling near or alongside to instruct.
- iii. Usually paraklesis except this one occurrence.
- iv. I Corinthians 1:3-7 ³Blessed *be* God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort; ⁴Who comforteth us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God. ²For as the sufferings of Christ abound in us, so our consolation also aboundeth by Christ. ⁶And whether we be afflicted, *it*

is for your consolation and salvation, which is effectual in the enduring of the same sufferings which we also suffer: or whether we be comforted, it is for your consolation and salvation. ⁷And our hope of you is stedfast, knowing, that as ye are partakers of the sufferings, so *shall ye be* also of the consolation.

v. Speak the truth in love

Ephesians 4:15 ¹⁵But speaking the truth in love, may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, *even* Christ:

I Thessalonians 4:9 ²But as touching brotherly love ye need not that I write unto you: for ye yourselves are taught of God to love one another.

Galatians 5:13-14 ¹³For, brethren, ye have been called unto liberty; only *use* not liberty for an occasion to the flesh, but by love serve one another. ¹⁴For all the law is fulfilled in one word, *even* in this; Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself.

e. Fellowship of the Spirit

- i.Fellowship- Greek word koinonia- Strongs Con.partnership, i.e. (literally) participation, or (social) intercourse, or (pecuniary) benefaction:- (to) communicate (-ation), communion, (contri-distribution, fellowship.
- ii. Partnership- in common
- f. These first three are all followed by a preposition
 - i.Of Christ
 - ii. Of Love- God is love (I John 4)
 - iii. Of the Spirit
- g. Bowels and mercies
 - i. Philippians 1:8 For God is my record, how greatly I long after you all in the bowels of Jesus Christ.
- II. **Philippians 2:2** ²Fulfil ye my joy, that ye be likeminded, having the same love, *being* of one accord, of one mind.
 - a. Fulfill my joy

- i. "My Joy"- used twice in Philippians- both times are in the context of unity. Paul's personal joy was connected to the body of Christ being in unity.
- ii. **Philippians 4:1** ¹Therefore, my brethren dearly beloved and longed for, my joy and crown, so stand fast in the Lord, *my* dearly beloved.
- b. Likeminded
 - i.One mind
- c. Same Love
 - i. Was some love lacking in 1:9?
 - i. **Philippians 1:9** ²And this I pray, that your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and *in* all judgment;
- d. One Accord
 - i.Joined as one soul
- e. One Mind
- f. All of this describes "unity"
 - i.United in Christ
 - ii. Psalm 133:1 (A Song of degrees of David.)
 Behold, how good and how pleasant *it is* for brethren to dwell together in unity!
 - iii. I Corinthians 12:12-14¹²For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body: so also *is* Christ. ¹³For by one Spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether *we be* Jews or Gentiles, whether *we be* bond or free; and have been all made to drink into one Spirit. ¹⁴For the body is not one member, but many.
 - iv. I Corinthians 12:18-20¹⁸But now hath God set the members every one of them in the body, as it hath pleased him. ¹⁹And if they were all one member, where were the body? ²⁰But now are they many members, yet but one body.

- v. I Corinthians 12:22-27²²Nay, much more those members of the body, which seem to be more feeble, are necessary: ²³And those *members* of the body, which we think to be less honourable, upon these we bestow more abundant honour; and our uncomely *parts* have more abundant comeliness. ²⁴For our comely *parts* have no need: but God hath tempered the body together, having given more abundant honour to that *part* which lacked:²⁵That there should be no schism in the body; but *that* the members should have the same care one for another. ²⁶And whether one member suffer, all the members suffer with it; or one member be honoured, all the members rejoice with it. ²⁷Now ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular.
- vi. Ephesians 4:3-5 ³Endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. ⁴There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; ⁵One Lord, one faith, one baptism,

vii. Euodias and Syntyche

- 1. Philippians 4:2-3²I beseech Euodias, and beseech Syntyche, that they be of the same mind in the Lord. ³And I intreat thee also, true yokefellow, help those women which laboured with me in the gospel, with Clement also, and *with* other my fellowlabourers, whose names *are* in the book of life.
- III. **Philippians 2:3** ³*Let* nothing *be done* through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves.
 - a. Don't
 - i. <u>Strife</u> **eritheía**, perhaps as the same as <u>G2042</u>; properly, intrigue, i.e. (by implication) faction:—contention(-ious), strife.
 - 1. Faction or rivalry
 - 2. Strife makes the work of the flesh list

- a. Galatians 5:20 ²⁰Idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies,
- 3. Strife different but similar word, contention used
 - a. **Philippians 1:16** ¹⁵Some indeed preach Christ even of envy and strife; and some also of good will: ¹⁶The one preach Christ of contention, not sincerely, supposing to add affliction to my bonds:
- 4. Remember the Corinthians and Apollos
 - a. I Corinthians 1:10-12 ¹⁰Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and *that* there be no divisions among you; but *that* ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment. ¹¹For it hath been declared unto me of you, my brethren, by them *which are of the house* of Chloe, that there are contentions among you. ¹²Now this I say, that every one of you saith, I am of Paul; and I of Apollos; and I of Cephas; and I of Christ.
- ii. <u>Vainglory</u>- Greek word kenodoxia- Strongs Con.; from <u>G2755</u>; empty glorying, i.e. self-conceit:—vain-glory.
 - 1. **Proverbs 27:2** ²Let another man praise thee, and not thine own mouth; a stranger, and not thine own lips.
 - 2. Only God's glory should be sought
 - a. I Corinthians 10:31 ³¹Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God.
- iii. Strife and Vainglory
 - 1. Rooted in self, not in others

i.Lowliness of mind

- 1. Acts 20:19 ¹⁹Serving the Lord with all humility of mind, and with many tears, and temptations, which befell me by the lying in wait of the Jews:
 - a. Not just people but the Lord with humility of mind
- 2. **Ephesians 4:2** ²With all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love:
- 3. Colossians 3:12 ¹²Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering;

ii. Esteem other better than themselves

- 1. <u>Esteem-</u> Greek word- hegeomai- <u>Strongs Con.</u> middle voice of a (presumed) strengthened form of <u>G71</u>; to lead, i.e. command (with official authority); figuratively, to deem, i.e. consider:—account, (be) chief, count, esteem, governor, judge, have the rule over, suppose, think.
- 2. Only used one other time as esteemed
 - a. **I Thessalonians 5:13**¹³And to esteem them very highly in love for their work's sake. *And* be at peace among yourselves.
- 3. <u>Used as "thought", "supposed", "count", "counted" elsewhere in Philippians. See Philippians 2:6, 2:25, 3:7, 3:8.</u>
- iii. Romans 12:10 ¹⁰Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honour preferring one another;
- iv. I Corinthians 15:10 ¹⁰But by the grace of God I am what I am: and his grace which was bestowed upon me was not in vain; but I laboured more abundantly than they all: yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me.

- IV. Philippians 2:4 ⁴Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others.
 - a. The things of others
 - i. Galatians 6:1-3 ¹Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted. ²Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ. ³For if a man think himself to be something, when he is nothing, he deceiveth himself.
 - b. Also- not neglecting self
 - i. **Ephesians 5:29** ²⁹ For no man ever yet hated his own flesh; but nourisheth and cherisheth it, even as the Lord the church:
