LIBRARY NEWS



EVER CONSTANT- by Tracie Peterson. Book three of the Treasures of Nome Series. On the surface, Whitney Powell is happy working with her sled dogs and welcoming the new additions to her family through her sisters marriages and an upcoming birth. But her life is full of complications, including an estranged father, that have her on the edge of losing control. Growing up, she was the strong sister, and she can't give that up now. When villagers in the outlying areas come down with a horrible sickness, Dr. Peter Cameron turns to Whitney and her dogs for help navigating the deep snow, and they become close while ministering the sick together. Peter has long recognized her finer qualities but is troubled by the emotions and secrets she keeps buried within. He wants to help but wonders if she is more of a risk than his heart can take. As sickness spreads throughout Nome and another man courts Whitney, she ans Peter will discover that sometimes it is only in weakness that you find strength.

HEART OF THE MIDWIFE. Four Historical stories by four authors. Four midwives overcome prejudices and superstitions of their profession an find a love of her own during the late 1800's.

~Love Charm by Cynthia Hickey. Ozark Mountains, 1868. Bound by a common bond of wanting help the Missouri Hill people they've grown to love, Phoebe Hudson, socialite-turned-midwife, and Luke Morris, the schoolteacher, find themselves mediators in a family feud.

~Love's Rebirth by Darlene Franklin. Denver, 1871. Dr. Vaughan Strahan, a war veteran, wants to work with expectant mothers so others don't die like his wife and child, but there is already a midwife working in the old mining district whose approval he is determined to win.

~If Not for Grace by Patty Smith Hall. New York City, 1889. After her friend's death in childbirth, Grace Sullivan converts a rundown apartment building into a haven for immigrant families preparing for the birth of a child. But when the city threatens to close her down, her only hope is to ask for help from an unlikely source-her former friend, Patrick O'Leary.

~Between Two Worlds by Marilyn Turk. New Orleans, 1890. When trained nurse Camille Duval moves to New Orleans to practice midwifery, she runs into resistance from the local voodoo queen. How can Camille convince the expectant mothers of the city to trust her instead of relying on superstitions? Can Camille enlist the support of the young family physician, Julian Charbonnet, who doesn't seem interested in "women's affairs"?

What's in a Name?

Luke 1:31 You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High.

Matthew 1:21 She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins.

The very first Advent season began with a visit from the angel to Mary and then to Joseph. Both visits included instructions to name their baby Jesus and a reason for the name. Jesus would be the Savior of His people, and He would be known as the Son of God. We name all sorts of things for the purpose they were designed. Names carry meaning. Sometimes we name buildings, facilities, or rooms for people to know what types of activities the space is designed to host. An example would be the naming of a community building. The building is specifically used to host community events such as weddings, graduations, soup suppers, or whatever else might benefit the community.

Over the last several months our church has grown, and we have had to be creative to find space for various ministries to meet. God has blessed our church leaders with the challenge to find alternative meeting spaces for a host of ministries due to our lack of space. We have several rooms that are now multipurpose spaces. We began to notice these room names were outdated or had little to do with the purpose of the space. We began to prayerfully consider different names for rooms that host a variety of ministries. One of the first rooms we decided needed a name change was the Adult Choir Room, now called the David Room. We made the change because the space is used nearly every day for ministries like consistory meetings, My Day, adult choir practice, etc. We believe the David Room reflects the purpose of the room. David was a musician and a righteous leader.

Some of the other name changes include the Connections Room, Martha Room, Elijah Room, and the War Room. The rooms are used by multiple ministries for a variety of purposes. The Connection room is for small groups to connect over a cup of coffee. The War room is a prayer room that hosts our several prayer ministries such as our Sunday School prayer warriors, who gather to pray during Sunday School and Mom's in Prayer. The Martha room is where we host many small group meetings with access to a kitchen; Martha is known for her relationship with Jesus and her willingness to serve. The Elijah room is where children worship during the week (maybe singing the song, Days of Elijah) and larger groups can gather for prayer, planning, and ministry events. All of these are reflected in the life and ministry of Elijah in some way. Understanding why we are making these small changes helps lower our anxiety about the change and focus on our mission to Share the Good News of Jesus. Over the next several months, we will do our best as a church to communicate any of these changes and to help you understand the reason.

What's in a Name? During this Christmas Season, I encourage you to take time to read your Bible and notice the names of Jesus; names such as Immanuel, Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Prince of Peace. Ask the question, what is the purpose of that name? Why is that name given to Jesus? My prayer is that we are a people of God who ask questions, seek understanding, and grow to become like Jesus more every day.
